AbbVie is committed to developing the highest quality products and ensuring the safety of the patients who use them. Secure disposal of medical waste is a part of this commitment. Accordingly, we have proactively taken a number of steps to address this concern in a socially responsible manner.

AbbVie has operated the HUMIRA® (adalimumab) Sharps Mail-Back Program since 2007. This program is provided to patients as an option for the safe and environmentally friendly disposal of HUMIRA needles following an injection. AbbVie provides sharps collection containers and mail-back boxes with pre-paid postage to each individual who enrolls. AbbVie educates patients on our sharps mail-back program through numerous channels including in-person nurse training, email, specialty pharmacies, mail, and other product educational information. AbbVie also supports collective, voluntary efforts to ensure that unused or unwanted medications are disposed in a safe and environmentally friendly manner. Patients are reminded at the time a prescription is filled that the medicine should be used as directed, which means that the patient is completing the prescription in the time and frequency per their clinician's instructions.
